

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

With Easter Sunday on 31st March, the start of April is school holiday time. I like holidays: they're a time to slow down and rest amidst the busyness of life, and also to catch up on activities we might not otherwise have the time to do. The anticipation of an upcoming holiday can be delightful: planning what we're going to do (or not do!) and where we're going to go (or not go!) and who we're going to see (or not see!). Unfortunately, holidays don't always turn out the way we want. Plans can change, unexpected situations can arise, or problems can occur like getting ill. I think it's doubly miserable when we get ill during a holiday: not only are we unwell, but we're also missing out on doing that thing we'd been anticipating for so long.

Sometimes we get ill while we're on holiday, other times we can get ill *because* we're on holiday. I'm not talking about strange food in another part of the world giving us an upset stomach. What I mean is how our bodies can go into shutdown mode: we get overly tired and sleepy, maybe even a cold or persistent headache too. It's as if our bodies spot us starting to rest, so they decide they have an excuse to stop us completely and force us to go almost into hibernation mode. It can be frustrating getting ill during time off over Christmas or Easter, but I wonder if it is our bodies protecting us amidst hectic lifestyles, stopping us from experiencing actual exhaustion.

Tiredness is something we all regularly experience, but sometimes life can get too much for too long and lead to burnout or breakdown. Sometimes past illnesses can leave us with life altering fatigue. Sometimes our bodies can seem to age faster than those around us. A number of years ago, I went through a difficult season of life and was unable to do much. At that time the verses at the end of Isaiah 40 took on new meaning:

Do you not know? Have you not heard?
The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth.
He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom.
He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak.
Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall;
but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength.
They will soar on wings like eagles;
they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.

SCHOOL COUNCIL TRIP TO PARLIAMENT EARLY MARCH

We had to be at school very early (6.30am) to travel to Runcorn station in the school minibus to catch the train to London.

London was very busy, there were lots of people buzzing around going about their everyday lives. We had to transfer to the underground to get to Parliament Education Centre.

We learned so much about Parliament that we would never have known had we not been there. Things like why only people who are chosen can be part of the House of Lords and who sits on certain benches. In the House of Commons, the members are elected by the voters. The Government front bench is on the right-hand side of the Speaker of the House of Commons and is occupied by Government ministers. The opposition front bench is occupied by shadow ministers who are the most senior in the Shadow Cabinet.

We went to see Westminster Hall where the Queen was laid out in state and thousands of people were able to walk through to pay their respects.

It was interesting to find out about how our Government debates issues and how Bills become Laws. We got the chance to debate our own subject when we went into a workshop. Our workshop room was set up like the House of Commons. Jennifer got to wear a wig and gown and was elected Speaker of the House, and we chose to debate on whether we should ban smoking. We all decided that it should be banned, but that the ban should be brought in gradually, so some people do not suffer withdrawal symptoms.

At the end of our workshop, our local MP Bill Esterson came to see us. He talked to us about what it is like to work in Parliament and why it is important for children to become engaged with politics and take up their right to a vote.

We loved our trip to Parliament and hope to take our families one day.

WOODLAND WORKSHOP

Woodland workshop. What? Where? Who? Why? These are important questions.

First, we need to define what we're talking about. The woodland is the area of ground, outside of the graveyards, delineated by the fence separating our site from that owned by the National Trust, so our ground is contiguous with that of the Trust. It is part of the Mersey Forest.

The woodland, in its current form, is very much the brainchild of Bob Wagstaff. In the past there was a move to plant up the area with local species and that's what happened. Now, I know many of you will walk into the churchyard, survey the trees and think to yourselves, "Oh, that's very green". However, I urge you to download a plant identification app on to your smartphone. Alternatively, find a young member of your family and get them to do it. You will find that what you thought of as a monoculture of sycamores with the odd white poplar is, in fact, a carefully planted variety of English trees. As for the sycamores, they are an invasive species that we try to eradicate before they become too large, for you will see we have basically coppiced these North American interlopers. (Look on the bright side: we've kept the grey squirrels at bay, and we don't have mink). To all lovers of this variety of maple, I say, "Fear not, the blasted things grow like dandelions in your lawn".

The Woodland Workshop team is drawn from a variety of people with an interest in managing the wild area in our churchyard. We have a pretty free hand but are effectively a subgroup who answer to the PCC. This may seem needlessly bureaucratic but is very useful to access funding for tree surgeons, for example, when some forty-metre-high white poplar has reached the end of its life (about 70 - they live fast and die young) and is about to take out the Meeting Room.

Perhaps I can give you an idea of the sort of work we do by describing a few of the current projects. The western boundary fence has a few gaps. Fair enough; nothing lasts forever. Instead of replacing the fence, we are going for a greener option and using sycamore poles (see, I told you they'd come in useful). This is not as long lasting as a commercial fence but gives a more homespun feel to the area. As the wood breaks down it forms a habitat for insects. The insects then form a food source for smaller woodland birds. Those birds then form part of the wider food chain. Over time we may replace some of the fencing prone to vandalism with more substantial barriers.

We are clearing some areas of ivy. Whilst a useful habitat, providing cover for insects and small mammals, you can have too much of a good thing. We are steadily clearing a space to the south of the Meeting Room. Attempts to introduce wildflowers have not met with success. However, as we ate baked potatoes, cooked in the ashes of incinerated ivy runners, and rested our chins on our hands, we have noted that broad leaved plants germinated in the cleared areas. In the shelter provided by these pioneer species (that's not dramatic licence, it's a genuine scientific term) we see brambles and grasses struggling to gain a toe hold. Thus, nature plans out the ecological succession better than us. Who'd 'a thunk it'? These hardy pioneers are not palatable to the local lagomorph population. Hopefully our floppy eared friends hop over to lunch on the grass of the graveyard, thereby reducing the amount of mowing we have to do.

Our tree planting has also resumed. We are working on an understorey of hazel and hawthorn, which we hope will encourage red squirrels into our area as the nuts will provide a source of sustenance for our persecuted bushy tailed little friends.

I hope this has given you a flavour of what we do. I look forward to welcoming more volunteers; we normally meet on the second Saturday morning of each month. Bring a nature loving disposition and sturdy footwear. We'll provide tools and, more importantly, coffee and baked potatoes.



POEMS FOR A LIFETIME


Untitled and writer unknown

NATIONAL TRUST ACQUIRES 193 ACRES AROUND LUNT VILLAGE

A new forest is coming to Lunt now that the conservation charity has acquired a series of unused agricultural fields from the local authority.

The National Trust is planning to create new woodland, wetland, and grassland areas on the 193 acres, with an eye towards boosting the biodiversity in the area. It is hoped that a variety of animals will opt to live in the new habitats, including red squirrels.

"Whilst the landscape around Lunt looks quite green, much of it is private farmland and not currently accessible", said Kate Martin, a lead ranger for the National Trust. "Securing this land gives us a brilliant opportunity to create more diverse habitats, enabling nature to



flourish in the area", she continued. "We know that people feel much more connected to nature when they can get out into it close to home, and that connectedness makes a huge difference to health and wellbeing".

Planting of the new forest would commence later this year, thanks to funds from Mersey Forest's award from the government's Trees for Climate programme. "The Mersey Forest team are excited that a project like this could be funded through a Trees for Climate grant", said Paul Nolan, director of Mersey Forest. "Lunt has long been a key strategic site identified in the Mersey Forest plan. This is a chance to bring the many benefits of woodland creation to Sefton, for communities, climate, and nature".

The benefits of the woodland were a deciding factor in Sefton Council's decision to sell the land, according to Leader Cllr Marion Atkinson. She referenced a council report about the proposed sale, stating "The report presented to cabinet showed the sale would have a positive impact on biodiversity of the area, contribute to increasing the ability of the area to capture carbon from new woodland planting and wetland creation, as well as offering new access opportunities to local people in Sefton". 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

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St George of the Golden Legend

St George is Patron Saint of England, but he never actually came here. He was a Christian officer in the Roman army under Diocletian, who refused to abandon his faith during the Terror. George was therefore martyred in Palestine about 300 AD. His courage became legendary, and St George became the example of a Christian fighting-man, a powerful helper against evil powers affecting individual lives. He was the soldier-hero of the Middle Ages. In the Golden Legend of the 13th century, Jacobus de Voragine tells the story of how St George helped rescue the people of Sylene in Lybia from a dragon, especially the princess, who had been offered to the dragon as a sacrifice. With the dragon dead, and

the princess returned to her father the King, the people of Sylene converted to Christianity.
