



From the Vicarage

At the time of going to press, I'm reliably informed there are only 40 sleeps to go until Christmas Day. I'm not sure if you or anyone in your house is counting down, but the Christmas fervour is only going to increase. Wreaths are already appearing on front doors, the Formby Christmas lights are up and tested awaiting their imminent switch on, choirs are practising carols and shops are hoping for a bumper festive season.

It's now the time of year that the major retailers try to outdo each other with their Christmas TV adverts. John Lewis has a heart-warming Christmas tree story with a Little Shop of Horrors twist. Aldi's offering sees the return of Kevin the Carrot at a Willy Wonka style factory. But it is Marks & Spencer's advert that caught my eye this year with the theme song "I would do anything for love".

M&S imagines celebrities getting ready for Christmas and putting up with things they don't really want to out of love for their friends and family. I guess most of us can relate to that! However, as anyone who's heard Meatloaf singing before will know, he does have limits— "but I won't do that!"—and so too do the celebrities. Cue all sorts of Christmas upset involving a fish tank, blowtorch, baseball bat, and even a garden shredder! As the music fades and logo appears, we're told, "This Christmas, do only what you love". If only it were that simple ...

While I enjoyed the mischievous twist, the advert also got me thinking that the first Christmas was God "doing anything for love". That all too familiar miracle-baby-in-a-manger story is actually the Creator becoming a creature, the divine becoming human, the King becoming a servant. The Son of God leaving his throne in heaven to come down to the muck and mess of this broken world is HUGE. And when we remember that Christmas happened so that Easter could occur, we realise that there is no "but I won't do that" with God. The most famous verse of the Bible (John 3:16—one I've sure I must have quoted here before) tells us: "God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." Jesus' birth paved the way for his death: nothing is off limits with God's love.

My prayer is that you'd experience the unlimited love of God afresh this Christmas as you consider Jesus. We'd love you to join us for our special Advent and Christmas services, as well as our regular Sunday services. Details are in the following pages, and *everyone* is invited to join us.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th - 25th January

This is traditionally observed as 18th – 25th January. Materials for the week in 2024 have been prepared by an ecumenical team from Burkina Faso facilitated by the local Chemin Neuf Community (CCN), and the chosen theme is 'You shall love the Lord your God...and your neighbour as yourself' (Luke 10:27). A very apt theme for 2024!

A PRIMARY SCHOOL CHRISTMAS: ST LUKE'S

If you have a couple of children or grandchildren, you will know how giddy and excited they can get in the run-up to Christmas. Imagine, if you can, almost 400 of them under one roof! A primary school is a very special place to be in December.

All our pupils learn about Christmas in their RE lessons. There is a different focus for each year group: Reception learn about Jesus' birth and that Jesus is the son of God; Y1 find out about why we give and receive gifts at Christmas; Y2 answer the question: *Why was the birth of Jesus such good news*? In Y3 we focus on God being with us at Christmas; our Y4 pupils explore the symbolism of light; Y5 consider the Christmas story in the gospels of Matthew and Luke; and finally, Y6 focus on the ways in which Christians prepare for Christmas.

Our Y1 pupils lead our church services at Christmas, re-telling the Nativity story and reading prayers they have written themselves. Y2 learn new songs and dance routines and put on several full-scale performances of the Nativity in the school hall for parents and friends. Tabz and Hettie from Southport Area Schools Workers Trust entertain the whole school with their version of the Christmas Story – this year entitled *To Nativity and Beyond!* And our Open the Book Team from Churches Together in Formby,



who regularly lead worship in school, come in to share their Nativity with us.

In addition to all of this, we have a Christmas Takeover Day, organised by our PTA, the Friends of St Luke's School (FOSLS) which includes Breakfast with Santa or a Christmas Brunch for the older pupils, lots of arts and crafts activities and a Christmas Party. Our lovely cook, Lydia, and her team of helpers in the kitchen will be preparing and cooking a Christmas Dinner for around 450 staff and pupils - that's a LOT of sprouts and roast potatoes! Our musicians (brass, guitar, woodwind and strings) perform in a Christmas Concert and our Y4 pupils sing in the



Church's Christingle celebration. Meanwhile, the Choir will be singing carols at the Formby Village Christmas Lights switch-on. As if all of that wasn't enough, this year we are joining a virtual *Green Christmas* workshop, organised by Gillmoss Recycling Discovery Centre, to find out more about recycling and climate change! Term

ends four days before Christmas – just enough time for the staff to prepare for their own family Christmases or to lie down in a darkened room!

Sheila became Scripture Union secretary, which enabled her to meet other members of the church as she distributed the notes. She also delivered Church Magazines around the parish. Outside the church, she became a member of the Formby Society.

At home, with Bob, they had Bible Study groups which again enabled her to meet more members of the church; the group evolved into Alpha groups which spread throughout the rest of St. Luke's.

Sheila was thoroughly Anglican and a regular communicant.

Two years ago, she had a fall in which she fractured her pelvis, and spent several weeks in hospital during the pandemic, which meant that Bob was unable to visit her. It was then that the first symptoms of dementia began to present themselves. After another fall, she was admitted to Southport hospital where, after three weeks, and excellent care, her Saviour called her home and she peacefully passed away.

FURTHER MEMORIES OF THE LATE REVD ROY BAKER - a wonderful Sunday service in the Black Forest - By Church Member Joyce Eddlestone

I first got to know Roy and Barbara 30 years ago when we had a deanery visit from a group of clergy from the Protestant Church of Baden in Germany. I only got involved because the clergy in our deanery couldn't provide enough beds, so they needed a few extra and a request was put in our weekly news sheet. Roy, who was Vicar of St Nicholas Blundellsands at that time, had offered to have some guests, and he and his wife Barbara welcomed Thea and Hanneli into their home. Since that time, Roy and Barbara have taken part in several exchange visits between the two deaneries of Sefton and Uberlingen-Stockach. Firm friendships have been made even though many participants didn't speak the other's language.

Some years ago, one of the German clergy, Dietmar, who had become a good friend, had the idea of organising a coach tour of England for his parish, visiting famous gardens. He thought it would be nice if they could come to Formby for a few days – what did I think? Was it possible to find enough people from our church to host them all? I wasn't sure, but when I asked, I quickly had enough offers of accommodation, including Bruni from St Jerome's, so it definitely was possible. By that time, Roy had retired to Formby and so was "one of us" at St Luke's. So, some time later, a large German coach arrived, bringing Dietmar, his wife Telse, and about 28 parishioners to Formby. Some of the friendships made between the hosts and the guests during that visit are still going strong today. And, of course, all the guests got to know Roy!

We were all invited to make a return visit to Dietmar's parish in St Georgen in the Black Forest. The next year, a group of us, including Roy and Barbara spent a lovely time staying in homes around St Georgen. There, the Protestant Church shared a very modern building with the local Roman Catholics. Before we set off, Dietmar and Telse asked Roy to pack his vestments, as they and the Roman Catholic Priest had planned an outdoor ecumenical service on the Sunday morning during our visit. They thought that it would be great to have English participation - making it not just ecumenical, but international as well!

One of my most treasured memories is of that service. We were all there, on a lovely bright sunny Sunday morning, surrounded by the beauty of the Black forest. The service was partly in English and partly in German. Leading from the front were the three clergy - Roy in his vestments, the Catholic Priest very similarly clothed as Roy, and Dietmar in his black Lutheran robe - all worshipping God together. Sitting in the congregation were our group from St Luke's, including Bruni; members of the Protestant Church of Baden; and members of the German Roman Catholic Church. Several of us took part, including Bruni, as our token Roman Catholic! It was a wonderful service - Roy and Dietmar were already firm friends, but the Priest really took to Roy, calling him his friend, and joked about how he envied Roy because he was able to retire - something the Priest wasn't allowed to do! Neither Roy nor the Catholic Priest could speak each other's language, but the joy and the friendship between them was plain to see. I wish I had thought to take a photo of the occasion. I've asked around, but unfortunately nobody present thought about a photo, I'm sorry to say. It was a real privilege and delight to be there, and a memory I shall always treasure. (Cont.p8)

I'm grateful that Roy had the opportunity to meet up with Dietmar and Telse again this year. It happened to be between Roy's many hospital stays. Roy, although very frail, but still with a bit of his old "bounce", spent a lovely afternoon at our house enjoying afternoon tea with Barbara, Dietmar and Telse.

Telse, after hearing the news that Roy had died, said how pleased she was to have had the opportunity to see Roy for the last time. Roy captured the hearts of the people from the Black Forest. When the sad news spread round St Georgen, Telse told me that the parishioners who could speak a little English were helping the others to send condolence cards to Barbara. We shall all miss him, but the memories live on!

ADVENT

Advent in the Christian calendar means 'coming' and is the period before Christmas which celebrates the birth of Jesus. It is all about preparing for Christmas Day and starts on Sunday December 3rd in 2023 – four weekends before Christmas.

Advent calendars traditionally would have images that show the story of the Nativity, as most still do. Some churches have an advent wreath with five candles, one for each of the four Sundays leading up to Christmas Day and one for Christmas Day itself.

EPIPHANY

In Christianity, the Epiphany refers to a realization that Christ is the Son of God. Western churches generally celebrate the Visit of the three Magi (Wise Men / Kings) as the revelation of the incarnation of the infant Christ and commemorate the Feast of Epiphany on January 6 (The 12th Day of Christmas). The season runs until the first Sunday of Lent.

The three Magi in Matthew's Gospel were distinguished foreigners who visited Jesus after his birth bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.





BRIEF REPORT OF THE SHYIRA TRUST AGM 2023

- Sunday 29 October 12.30pm St Luke's Church meeting room.
- 18 members attended + 6 guests. 8 members gave apologies for absence.
- 5 new members joined the Trust at the end of the meeting.
- Chair, Mr Peter Morgan, opened the meeting with a short prayer which included In Memoriam members and others associated with the Trust who had passed since the last AGM.
- Minutes of the 2022 AGM were unanimously accepted with no matters arising.
- The Chair presented the Accounts highlighting a minor amendment relating to incorrect
 placement of income from membership subs and money received for banana leaf card
 sales in the unrestricted and restricted columns of Section A (Financial Statement). The
 total income remained unchanged from the originally circulated Accounts.
- The Accounts were then unanimously accepted with no queries.
- Former trustee and treasurer, Mr Hugh Dixon, was formally thanked by the Chair for his assistance in drawing up the Accounts for the 2023 AGM.
- The Chair briefly presented the Trustees' Report, highlighting Bishop Augustin's request for the Trust to financially support his 5 ongoing projects over 2022-23 in Kivu Diocese. They are – palliative care in the community; church leadership courses and development; job creation among youth and women; fighting malnutrition and stunting; supporting home and family life.
- The Trustees' Report was unanimously accepted without comment.
- Trustees Mr Keith Braithwaite, Mrs June McGibbon and Revd Jane Morgan stepped down after their latest 3-year tenure of excellent service to the Trust; Mr Colin Cooke, Mr Ken Davies and Mr Peter Morgan were to continue as trustees, with KD continuing as the PCC nominated trustee.
- Mrs Margaret Cooke would continue as Voluntary Helper assisting with the sponsorship
 of students in Groupe Scolaire (secondary school).
- Two church members of the group which had recently visited Shyira through the church link with St Mark's had expressed interest in becoming co-opted trustees.
- The number of 3 remaining trustees and potentially 2 co-opted trustees was in line with the Trust's Constitution.
- Mr Peter Morgan was unanimously re-elected Chair and Mr Ken Davies likewise as Secretary until the next AGM. In the absence of a designated Treasurer, all financial matters were to be the collective responsibility of trustees.
- Mr James Patterson had agreed to continue as Independent Examiner until the next AGM.
- In conclusion -
 - (i) Trust member and Consultant Clinical Psychologist, Dr Dominic Bray, gave a brief summary of his role/interest in relation to palliative care, mentioning the different approach adopted in Rwanda to here in the UK, the approach in Rwanda being traditionally church based and within the family. However, palliative care in the community is now one of Bishop Augustin's 5 identified projects for support.
 - (ii) The Chair presented the new Trust website: www.shyiratrust.org.uk
- The meeting closed at 1.19pm with The Grace.




The story of Silent Night

much-loved This carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked schoolmaster, the local Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in nearby village Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved world-wide; and the version

sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.


