



From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

I've got a confession to make: I cause the magazine editors a lot of stress each month. This letter may appear first in the magazine, but it is almost without fail the last article to be written. I don't quite know what goes wrong: each month I have it on my to-do list to be done in plenty of time. And yet, each month I receive reminders (very polite ones, I might add) to submit it. Without fail, I seem to lose several days around the middle of each month and before I know it, I'm late and the magazine team are waiting for me so it can go to print.

Usually, I work reasonably well under pressure. But there's something about inspiration under pressure: it seems to evaporate. My mind goes blank. Even if I can think of something semi-interesting that has recently happened, I struggle to turn one introductory paragraph into a full page. Where am I going to go with it? What encouragement or challenge can I reflect on from it? How does it help me to understand something about life with Jesus that I can share with others?

I wonder what causes your mind to go blank. Is it when there's an important decision to be made? We can sometimes see both sides of the argument so well that we end up stuck on the fence. Or is it starting out: when faced with a blank slate, we don't know where to begin. How often things would seem easier if only we had something to work with. Or is it a fear of the future, a fear of the unknown? The status quo often seems preferable: we can cope with what we know.

What do we do when the future seems uncertain, when it seems blank, and we're not sure what to do? What can we do? What should we do? Where do we turn when we're lacking inspiration in life, or it feels like we're running on empty?

At the end of the Bible, in Revelation 21:6, John quotes the Lord Jesus Christ, saying:

"It is done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning and the End. To the thirsty I
will give water without cost from the spring of the water of life."

Jesus describes himself as the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet (the language the New Testament was written in). He's saying he's the first and the last, the Beginning and the End. Not just that he was about at the beginning and will be about at the end, but he *is* the beginning and also the end. Jesus has the whole world in his hands because he is the one who began everything, and the one in whom all things will find their completion, their fulfilment. Jesus is the ultimate aim and purpose of the whole universe.

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS

FLOODS AND LANDSLIDES AROUND SHYIRA

In an email from Shyira, Revd Jacques told us, "During the night of 2nd May we had the catastrophe of floods and landslides in Shyira and in part of Western province. Many houses and crops were destroyed, and one person was found dead, and we are searching for three who are lost". Those of us who have been to Shyira have seen a gradual change of the climate with more storms and floods, but this is the worst so far.

Many houses are quite small, built with mud bricks and having a timber frame to secure a corrugated iron roof. They are not able to withstand the force of water, see the picture to the right, but are home for the families living in them. Our latest information is that 133 families with 540 family members are camped on Shyira hill in and around the old hospital buildings. The health centre that was in those buildings has moved into the new hospital.





Families have been given a mattress, just one per family, see the picture, but the needs are still great. Although Rwanda is increasing in prosperity, there is still extreme poverty in rural areas like Shyira. A pastor of Shyira once told me, "Poverty is rampant among my people", and little has changed.

Ultimately new homes must be provided for the 133 families, but for now the parish must provide emergency relief estimated to cost £36,600. Are we able to give them any help? Donations may be made through the Donate button on the parish website or in a clearly marked envelope in church.

GOD IN THE SCIENCES

(From a series written by Dr Ruth M Bancewicz - Church Engagement Director at the Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge)

It's difficult as a scientist to hear information that is fascinating, but which also involves so much suffering for other people. I worked for a time in a leukaemia research lab. We had to let other people's pain drive our research without it crippling our ability to concentrate on our work. But, during lockdown, I found myself – as a biologically-educated bystander – avoiding looking into the science of COVID-19, because the reminders of its impact on people's lives were everywhere that I looked.

One of the ways I managed my own feelings during the pandemic was by digging deeper into what God has revealed to us about His character, letting that fuel my faith, my prayers, and my actions. For more academic types like me, study – particularly of the Bible – can be one of the primary ways we connect with God and hear from Him. It's not wrong to be comforted by books, so long as the contents turn our eyes upwards and outwards.

First of all, God hears: "The Lord is close to the broken-hearted" (Psalm 34:18a). "In Jesus God took on human form, and He showed us His heart for the world. When His friend Lazarus died, He wept" (John 11). God is "the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort" (2 Corinthians 1:3).

Human sin has affected the whole of creation, and I believe this is largely the direct impact of our mismanagement of creation and mistreatment of each other. COVID-19 may well be another animal's friendly virus, pushed by human activity into causing havoc in bodies where it doesn't belong.

But God's world remains good. It is still fruitful, praising Him, as Psalm 19 describes. Even pictures of a deadly virus can seem beautiful – especially to a biologist! These good things are hints of the promised "new heavens and new earth" mentioned in the New Testament. One day "creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay" (Romans 8: 21), and for everyone who follows God, "He will wipe every tear from their eyes" (Revelation 21: 4).

Behind the debates about suffering is sometimes the assumption that God doesn't care. My experience is that God does care deeply, and He invites His Church to care for those around them – especially the most vulnerable. He is with us, He hears us and grieves with us, He helps us and promises a better future. (Extracted from Parish Pump website)



FATHERS' DAY - 18TH JUNE



In the UK, USA and Canada, the third Sunday in June is Fathers' Day. It's usually a good time for sons and daughters to take their father to his favourite restaurant, or to watch a favoured sport, or whatever else he enjoys doing.

How will you celebrate it this year? If your own father cannot be with you, how about a Zoom meeting?

How do these special days ever get started, anyway? Well, Fathers' Day began because way back in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, Washington, named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a

church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother. Mothers' Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora Louise Smart Dodd knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. So, the sermon on mothers gave Sonora Louise the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart.

Sonora Louise soon set about planning the first Fathers' Day celebration in Spokane in 1910. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off, and a 'Fathers' Day' was appointed. Sonora Louise had wanted Fathers' Day to be on the first Sunday in June (since that was her father's birthday), but the city council didn't have time to approve it until later in the month. And so, on June 19th, 1910, the first Fathers' Day was celebrated in Spokane.

Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Fathers' Day flower. Some people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Fathers' Day - a permanent, national holiday.

EXTRACTS FROM THE ANNUAL REPORT ENDING 31ST DECEMBER 2022 PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING HELD IN THE CHURCH MEETING ROOM ON WEDNESDAY 10TH MAY 2023 COMMENCING AT 7.30PM

Our Statement of Public Benefit is:

- 1. Regular public worship open to all.
- 2. The provision of a space for personal prayer and contemplation.
- 3. Pastoral work, including visiting the sick and bereaved.
- 4. Teaching of Christianity through sermons, courses, and small groups.
- 5. Taking of religious assemblies in schools.
- 6. Promotion of Christianity through the staging of events and meetings, and the distribution of literature.
- 7. Promoting the whole mission of the Church through provision of activities for senior citizens, parents and toddlers, young people, and other special needs groups.
- 8. Supporting other Christian charities in the UK and overseas.

Review of activities during 2022:

This year our Sunday services have returned to some sense of pre-covid normality, with many new people joining us. The two morning services continue to complement each other with traditional and more contemporary forms of liturgy and music. We replaced the Church Bibles with the modern and easy to read NIV translation, to make it easier for people to follow along as the sermon is preached. Our second service at 10.30am has again been streamed on Zoom for those continuing to isolate at home. Both services have tea and coffee served afterwards, to allow people the chance to catch up and get to know each other. Our monthly Parish Breakfasts have continued, and we held our first Church Picnic in September, which brought together many from both services. Our Sunday Children's Groups and Creche in the Meeting Room have grown and some of the new congregation members have started to help lead and teach the children. A Youth Group began in the summer term on Sunday evenings, hosted at the vicarage involving food, games and a chat about Christianity. The Pastoral Visiting Team aids the Vicar in bringing spiritual support and encouragement to those unable to come to church on a Sunday morning.

Special services throughout the year have continued to welcome local people into church who don't come regularly. These have included the Memorial Service for those recently bereaved, Christingle, Candlelit Carols, Blue Christmas, Crib Service and Christmas Midnight Communion. St Luke's hosted Christmas services for Habla Nursery, St Luke's School, Range High, and Rotary. The uniformed organisations join us at all-age parade services for Mothers' Day, Harvest and Remembrance Sunday. In January we held a centenary memorial service for the world-famous Irish playwright, poet and artist Percy French who is buried in the graveyard. Representatives from the Irish Government, Percy French Society and Formby Civic Society took part in the celebrations after the service. Our midweek activities have continued and grown. In the summer term we hosted the Bible Society's Bible Course and from this re-launched Home Groups which now see six groups meeting each week in people's homes to study the Bible together and pray for each other. Once a month the home groups met together for a Church Prayer Meeting. The Lifeboat Tea Room returned to a full offering from May to August, welcoming over a thousand people onto our church grounds. Tuesday lunches and Saturday drop-ins continued the hospitality for the rest of the year. The Woodland Workshop met once a month to take care of the wooded area of the churchyard.

The PCC have worked through the Leading your Church into Growth course material and have been considering how to 'join up' the various outreach events we put on by linking them with evangelism and discipleship activities. In addition to activities already mentioned, we regularly host the What if? Course to give people the opportunity to hear more about the Good News of Christianity and ask questions in a relaxed setting. Baptism families and a wedding couple joined the course this year.

St Luke's continues to financially support over a dozen Christian charities in the UK and abroad. These include local charities such as Southport Soup Kitchen, and long-term partners in Shyira, Rwanda. Our links with St Luke's Primary School continue through providing governors, taking assemblies and services, hosting church visits, giving each pupil an age-appropriate Christian book for a Christmas present and retired members of the congregation helping children with their reading. Through Churches Together we continue to support joint Christian mission in our local community, such as the Nativity and Passion Plays and the Formby Food Pantry. All in all, 2022 has been a busy year for St Luke's Church with many encouragements.

Future plans:

As we look to the future, our main aim is to continue and to grow what we currently do: sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ with people in our community and building up the whole congregation to know, love and trust the Lord Jesus better. As we do this, we will continue to review our Sunday services, midweek activities, and outreach events to welcome everyone and make disciples.

We hope and pray the children youth activities will continue to grow, and we will need to consider how this work may expand with our current resources. Already we are finding the Meeting Room is reaching capacity on Sunday mornings. As the Scout and Guide groups increasingly use the building throughout the week, it is making it more difficult for evening midweek church events. The congregation, and in particular the PCC, now need to consider the possibility of a building project to expand the Meeting Room.

Our largest outreach activity is the Lifeboat Tea Room. At the end of this year's season the management committee stood down after many years of service. With no obvious replacements, the Tea Room may need to undergo some changes and the church will need to decide how best to continue this ministry.


A 17th CENTURY NUN'S PRAYER






