

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

Chocolate, beer, cigarettes, meat, wine, coffee, social media ... have you given up any of these for Lent?! If so, how's it going? We're now two weeks into Lent and by the end of the month it'll be Easter. Some of us will have given up, other's will have failed by accident (old habits die hard, especially reaching for that morning biscuit with the cuppa) and a few will keep going to the end. One year as a teenager I tried giving up chocolate, crisps and fizzy drinks. All I remember is being invited to an usually large number of parties and there wasn't much I was able to eat or drink! Since then, I've considered much more carefully before deciding whether to give something up for all of Lent.

Of course, giving up things for Lent isn't just something Christians do. Many people who have no connection with church spend the 40 days (or 46 if you include the feast days of Sunday) giving something up. It's akin to new year's resolutions. At new year, we often try to start doing something. At Lent we often try to stop doing something. Sometimes we hope the change will become a habit, other times we're glad to get going again.

One of the dangers of Lent is that we focus on ourselves. We fast from chocolate because we want to lose weight, or we stop looking at social media because we want to start a new habit. Even if we fast for spiritual reasons, we can fall into the trap of thinking we need to fast to earn God's attention or pleasure, so it comes down to our effort. But the original reason for fasting is less to do with our effort, and more to do with what Jesus accomplished.

In Philippians 2:6–8, Paul urges us to consider Jesus Christ:

who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death — even death on a cross!

Never mind chocolate or wine or the occasional meal, Jesus gave up *everything*. Jesus gave up his glory as the Son of God when he became a human being. He gave up the throne room of heaven for a manger in a stable. And he continued to give up everything, including his life, when he died on the cross.

NSPCC NUMBER DAY AT ST LUKE'S CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

The NSPCC is a charity organisation that supports children's mental health and wellbeing and works to protect children from harm. NSPCC stands for National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Our teachers use some of their resources in PSHE (Personal, Social, Health, Economic) lessons throughout the year, but we recently had a whole special day devoted to maths activities and number puzzles. It was the NSPCC Number Day, and it is held every year as a national awareness and fundraising event.

When we celebrated the NSPCC Number Day in school on Friday 2nd February, we all came to school wearing something with a number on it or dressed as a number.

We did lots of really fun challenges and puzzles, alongside regular maths, which was enjoyed by all of our peers (and the teachers!).

Here are some fun facts about NSPCC and the number day -

- They help make 1 million children a year safer from abuse.
- The NSPCC charity has actually been around for 140 years!
- The NSPCC slogan is "every childhood is worth fighting for" and we agree!
- The first number day took place in 1999.
- This was the first time St Luke's had taken part, and we raised £253.25 for the charity.

The girls have enjoyed a mixed term, which included making their own poppies for Remembrance Sunday, practising a dance which the whole unit was involved in, a selection of Christmas crafts and a joint meeting with 8th Formby Brownies. This is something we try to include every term, as we feel it breaks down the barriers for Brownies thinking about coming to Guides and makes the whole transition less daunting. The term was finished off with a Christmas movie night accompanied by pizza. This year we chose to watch 'The Grinch Who Stole Christmas' and much fun was had by all.

So far this year the girls are exploring women in STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths). They have been constructing buildings made of card and have built a shelter made entirely out of newspaper, to much hilarity as the entire team they were in had to attempt to enter it! In the near future we are hoping to do some science experiments involving slime and 'space' dust.

Girl Guiding as a whole faces an uncertain future as it has to contend with an ever-growing list of activities for young people, but at St Luke's we are certainly doing our best to keep the unit going. So far, we are succeeding - long may it continue!



ST LUKE'S LENT PROJECT 2024 - GIVING MUCH NEEDED SUPPORT TO LIMA (PERU) AND SHYIRA (RWANDA)

THE SCHOOL IN LIMA-PROVIDING A WAY OUT OF THE POVERTY TRAP FOR THE CHILDREN FROM THE SHANTY TOWN

If you stand and look at a hillside on the outskirts of Lima, Peru, there's a shanty town which stretches as far as the eye can see. For the families who live there, life is a daily struggle to survive. Some manage to earn small amounts by doing odd jobs if they are lucky enough to find one. Covid made life even more difficult by putting an end to most of those. Some scavenge for food. Many go hungry. The local church does what it can to help the families. During the Covid outbreak they sent me photos of helpers out on the hillside, stirring huge cauldrons of soup over wood fires to give to the local people.

Long before Covid struck, the daughter of the local pastor, Isabel, realised that unless she did something, the children born into the families living in the shanty town would just be condemned to the same lifestyle as their parents. So, she set up a school. Her aim was to give the children a good education - good enough so they could get good jobs which would enable them to earn a decent wage and climb out of the poverty trap.



She stepped forward in faith. The school building (see photo on p6), not purpose built, leaves much to be desired, but the standard of teaching is the best. Isabel employs good teachers. The local authority does provide some funding, but nowhere near enough. Isabel sometimes has to make up the extra from her own pocket when the school funds can't cover the teachers' salaries. Knowing the background to the school, I was amazed when she sent me photos of the senior pupils equipped with safety glasses and lab coats doing an experiment in their science lesson; photos of the under-9 football team proudly holding the cup they had won; photos of infants in front of an audience of their parents doing a sailor's dance; photos of all the things you might expect from a school here in Formby, but certainly not from a school in a shanty town in Lima!

Soon after the school was first opened, Isabel noticed that many children were struggling to concentrate because they were so hungry. So, she decided that she would give them a meal each day, which all adds to the running costs, but the difference it has made to their health and education levels has been tremendous.

Because it's summer in Lima at the moment, the equivalent of our school summer holidays begin at Christmas in Peru. School is closed during January and some of February. This is the time when Isabel and her friends and family do sorting out and basic maintenance work in the school. Building repairs come quite low on the priority list, but sometimes they raise their ugly head - during this year's holidays a huge crack appeared in the ceiling in the younger children's classroom, and then some of the ceiling fell down. Isabel is thankful that the school was closed at the time, so no children were hurt. However, she doesn't have the funds for the repairs at the time I'm writing this, so we're all praying hard!

On a personal note, Isabel was recently ordained deacon in the Anglican church - her husband and father are both ordained, as are other members of her family. I asked her whether this would mean she wouldn't be spending as much time in the school now. Her answer was a most definite, "no!". She is really dedicated to her calling in the school.

I can't think of a more deserving cause for our Lent Project to support!

LENT PROJECT - SHYIRA

Following our visit to Shyira last October we have been blessed through the strengthening of our relationship with the parishioners of St Mark's, Shyira. We now have a closer understanding of how we can support our brothers and sisters in Christ in Shyira, both financially in support of various projects and of course through our prayers.

Rev Jacques at St Mark's and also Headteacher of Groupe Scolaire Secondary School, Helen Nyirabazungu, Headteacher of the Primary School and Zilpa, Rev Jacques' wife who oversees the Mothers' Union have kindly shared with us three projects for which this year's Lent Project monies could be used to make a big difference.

Groupe Scolaire



Externally, the structure of the school buildings appears to be in a reasonable state, but internally they are in poor condition – for example, the main hall has limited lighting, the science laboratories have no stools, the girls' room is barely usable, the library has limited

English books, and the IT equipment is also very limited. The school would



like to be able to have the funds to conduct repairs, purchase essential resources, as well as develop a multi game playground for Basketball, Volleyball and Handball.

Shyira Primary School

The fabric of the school is poor (doors missing and windows broken) and the school has limited resources to be able to make these repairs. The school struggles to provide the basics such as reading books, pens, pencils, and notebooks. They would like to be able to purchase essential resources and improve the play areas of the school, especially for the younger children by providing swings and sports equipment such as footballs and sports clothing.



Work of the Mothers' Union (MU)

The Mothers' Union is a crucial lifeline in the Shyira community supporting widows, child-headed families, and Aids victims. Recently, Chantal Mbanda (The Archbishop's wife) has



presented the wife of each pastor with a pig to encourage the work of the MU. Zilpa has now developed this into a

project by buying another pig and building some pig styes. When the pigs produce piglets, they will be given to others in the community



and when they reach maturity, sold and the monies used to support vulnerable families. The MU continues to make handicrafts which they then sell; monies from

which are again used to support vulnerable families. They would benefit from items such as sewing machines and materials to enable them to make their crafts.



For new believers to grow in their relationship with God, and for more people in the communities to come to faith in Jesus Christ.



LUNT MEADOWS NATURE RESERVE - RUN BY LANCS WILDLIFE TRUST

This spectacular wetland nature reserve, nestled along the meandering River Alt in North Merseyside, wasn't always the wildlife wonderland it is today. Between 2012 and 2014 it was intensively farmed arable land, and only when it was bought by the Environment Agency for development as a flood storage reservoir (that would double as a nature reserve) did Lunt Meadows become a real destination for bird-lovers.

Spring and summer see the water burst into life as breeding waders flock to the reserve in huge numbers. Lapwings, redshank, dunlin and oystercatchers jostle for position with herons and egrets – we have even had little ringed plovers and avocets breeding at Lunt Meadows. But these aren't the only water birds to put on a show. Other sightings have included everything from teal, gadwall and ruff to snipe and black-tailed godwits.

LUNT MEADOWS ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE

Run by the Museum of Liverpool, Lunt Meadows is a place where nomadic stone-age people built and lived in some of the first houses in Britain, around 8,000 years ago. The remains of a building on the site gave a radio-carbon dating of 5,800 BC. The settlement of these huntergatherers seems to have been well organised and many primitive tools have been found. If you google "Lunt Meadows Archaeological Site" you will find a wealth of interesting information.

The site was excavated about 10 years ago and during the excavations a group from Formby Civic Society was given a guided tour. We suspect that there is no interpretation board set up to give information on-site. Perhaps someone can verify this?

At the moment the nature reserve is not accessible for wheelchairs, mobility scooters and buggies but the Trust is hoping to remedy this situation – at least partly – in the not-too-distant future.

ST LUKE'S CHARITIES

St Luke's PCC continue to donate 10% of the monies received through voluntary giving each year to eleven different charities. This is one of an occasional series of articles highlighting the work of one of those charities.

EMBRACE the Middle East

Each month at the St Luke's Prayer Meeting, Matt provides a short presentation on the work of one of the charities that St Luke's supports and invites us to pray for it. For the January meeting, he had selected Embrace the Middle East, an organisation which we have supported for many years but whose work sadly seems even more necessary as the news headlines are dominated by the ongoing hostilities in Gaza. There was a feeling of sadness as we are conscious that these are the lands in which so much of the Bible is rooted.

How did Embrace start?

There has long been a need for support for the Christian communities in the Middle East. Embrace was founded in 1854 as the Turkish Missions Aid Society, working with Armenian Christians. In 1893, the name was changed to BibleLands Missions Aid Society as the area in which the charity worked was extended, and finally to Embrace the Middle East in 2012.

Where does Embrace work now?

The list of countries in which Embrace works have all witnessed traumatic events in recent years: international war, civil war, earthquakes, floods. The impact of some of these events can last for years as it takes time to rebuild communities and facilities. The countries are: Iraq, Syria, Israel/Palestine, Egypt and Lebanon.

Who does Embrace help?

Embrace works with Christians in marginalised communities in the Middle East, partnering with local organisations. The projects may be practical in nature, such as providing refuge after disasters or healthcare, with a particular focus on providing specialist services for the disabled. Others centre around education and human rights advocacy.

We may feel overwhelmed by the enormity of the suffering that we see on our television screens and powerless to know what can be done in the face of longstanding and apparently irreconcilable conflicts, but others are called to work in these difficult situations and need our prayers as well as financial support. Embrace publish a series of prayer diaries: more information can be found on their website, embraceme.org.




Love and serve one another

On Maundy Thursday we recall the final command that Jesus gave to His disciples before His death. After the Last Supper, He rose and washed His disciples' feet. This was astonishing for a 'teacher' to do, but He had a firm purpose in mind: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The 'washing of the feet' ceremony was an important part of the medieval

church's liturgy, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.


