

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends

Last month saw a total solar eclipse delighting folk in North America, with a partial eclipse taking place here in Formby. Sadly, the cloud cover didn't make for a dramatic sunset across the Irish Sea. However, the resulting Spring tide, which coincided with stormy weather, had a dramatic effect on the coast. There are now mini cliffs along the length of the dunes and the wooden boardwalk had its bottom section dislodged.

The boardwalk has been closed for safety reasons and, while understandable, is a bit of a pain: it's my favourite way to get to the beach, and not just because it is the closest to the vicarage. As some of you know, I like to go running a few times a week and really enjoy running along the beach. There's nothing worse than being at the end of a run and having to run uphill on soft sand through the dunes with tired legs. While I can't claim to have ever run through actual treacle, I suspect soft sand is worse: at least treacle doesn't make your feet go backwards! I'm very much looking forward to the boardwalk being repaired and my favourite way to the beach reopening.

In the Bible, Jesus uses the idea of a "way" to describe himself. He says in John 14:6,

I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. Jesus is saying that he is the way, he is the route to God. Jesus is how we can access a relationship with God the Father. He is the one who can introduce us to God. And because Jesus is the way to God, he is the one who brings life, who is life.

But Jesus goes further, which doesn't sound very politically correct: he is the *only* way to God the Father. He says he is *the* way, not *a* way, and, just in case we missed it, says explicitly, "No one comes to the Father except through me". This is where Jesus is different from the boardwalk through the dunes. He's not simply the best route or someone's favourite route among many possible routes. He is the only route to God the Father.

That can be hard for many of us to hear, never mind accept. But in fact, it is good that this is true because it means we can be fully confident in Jesus. Because Jesus is the only way to God, we can be sure he will lead us to God. He will never take a wrong turn. And because he is the only way, he will never be superseded by someone or something better. As the only, he is already the best. And finally, he will never be washed away or closed temporarily by a storm. That's the truth Jesus wants us all to know.


As always, our Leaders have kept us busy with lots of activities that enable us to earn more badges.



FORMBY BEFRIENDING SCHEME - CHARITY NO 1171771



(Working together to reduce loneliness and isolation among older people)



"Many older people become lonely when they lose a loved one or family move away from the area; sometimes their mobility declines or they develop health problems that result in them being confined to the house more often. This can make them feel very isolated and lead to increased anxiety or, in some cases, depression.

The Formby Befriending Scheme (FBS) offers companionship and support to older people who have become isolated or who are no longer able to get out as much as they need to. Our main aim is to match volunteers to older people in Formby, Hightown and Ince Blundell who might benefit from the regular companionship of a 'befriender'.

Regular Coffee Clubs are held to provide a meeting place for people involved in the FBS and others who perhaps live alone or simply want to make new friends." 



THOUGHT FOR MAY

May is Mental Health Awareness Month and has been observed since 1949. How the physiological processes of the brain and psychological workings of the mind function are both beyond my meagre comprehension. I know the brain exists as an organ inside the head of a human body, but where can we find the mind within that same body? Does it exist at all in any tangible form? If we acknowledge that it does exist and thereby influences our mental thought processes and subsequent actions – mind over matter for better or worse – then we need to take its existence seriously. After all, MIND is a mental health charity and that exists.

At the extremities of the mind's workings, we can experience great joy and happiness at one end polarised against grave anxiety and depression at the other. Mental illness can harm us for a lifetime - and even destroy us altogether! What then is the best therapy for anyone persistently prone to the downside of life? Answer – make Jesus your best friend!

St Luke's PCC continue to donate 10% of the monies received through voluntary giving each year to eleven different charities. This is one of an occasional series of articles highlighting the work of one of those charities.

MERCY SHIPS

Living on the coast as we do, it seems appropriate that one of the charities which we support has a maritime connection. **Mercy Ships** is an international charity, working to follow Jesus' example of bringing hope and healing to the poor. Its main aims are to provide:

- Medical care and surgery
- Training for local healthcare professionals
- Improvements to healthcare infrastructure

It operates in some of the poorest coastal nations in Africa from its two hospital ships, *Africa Mercy* and *Global Mercy*. In sub–Saharan Africa, around 90% of the population do not have access to safe, timely and affordable surgery.

The charity worked on projects and partnerships with nine African countries in 2023:

- Senegal and Gambia: Global Mercy based at Dakar for surgeries up until June, in addition to training local health professionals. This was the first period of field service for Global Mercy
- Guinea: training in dentistry, anaesthetics and biomedical engineering in partnership with the University
- Sierra Leone: Global Mercy arrives in August to start a 10-month period of field service during which hundreds of surgeries will be performed
- Liberia and Benin: anaesthesia training and nutritional agriculture training programmes
- Togo: working in partnership with local organisations providing cataract surgery
- South Africa: obstetrics and paediatrics training
- Madagascar: preparation for field service in 2024, assessing patients

During the year, *Africa Mercy* was refitted in South Africa. This included renovations to the hospital, updating laboratory, pharmacy and radiology equipment in addition to maintenance of less specialised areas of the vessel. It is hoped that *Africa Mercy* will now be able to continue its work well into the 2030s.

The scope of the work is very wide, but the impact on individuals is often life changing. Many of the health conditions which are treated are those that are associated with poverty and could otherwise be eradicated.

Moise KANYAMUHANDA in Rwanda

Moise, or Moses as he is known in English, is a Catechist in Rwanda. A Catechist is the Rwandan equivalent of a Reader in England. I first got to know him when I went to Shyira in 2001 and have been very friendly with him ever since. In Rwanda Catechists are often used to run churches, or a second church of a parish, referred to as a sub parish.



Moses was moved from Shyira to Butaka where he was tasked with planting a church and getting a building for the new congregation. We at St. Luke's helped with funding for the new church building. Moses was an excellent person for the task because he is a dedicated evangelist. On one occasion when a group from St Luke's were visiting, we came across Moses conducting a Bible study.

There was a group of women sat on the grass verge of a track with Moses standing in the roadway teaching with guite a lot of arm waving (see picture).

I am no longer able to travel to Rwanda and that has prompted Moses to send me an email that contained the following message (English is his third language so you will need to excuse the errors):

'For us, we are good and still serving the Lord where we were appointed by Bishop of Shyira Diocese as new leader of Sub Parish even if we still struggling with long Walking Journey from our home place to church but we thank God for his trust on us.

Truly, we have a request that we want to address to you, we wish that you can find for us a New friend at Formby parish which is active especially in those who use to come and visit Rwanda as you did in the years ago, so that we can have a Friendship and being Connected with so that he/she may also visiting us at Church as you did before.

We wish you a blissful Lent Season as we experience the Love of God upon the World.

May the Lord bless you and keep you make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you.'

Please let me know if you would like to be that friend and I will put you in touch with Moses.

(NB Moses' parish is in Shyira Diocese. Shyira village is part of Kivu Diocese under Bishop Augustin. Shyira Diocese has its own separate bishop).





Rogation Sunday

The first Sunday in May is Rogation Sunday. This is when many parishes still 'beat the bounds'. Rogation means an asking of God - for blessing on the seed and land. The practice began with the Romans, who processed around the cornfields each Spring, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, in order to get rid of evil. About 465 AD the Western world was suffering from earthquake and storm. Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the pagan custom, ordered that prayers should be said in the ruined or neglected fields. Thus 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial. It arrived in England early in the eighth century. Each Spring, led by the priest, a little party from the parish would set out with a Cross to trace the boundaries of the

parish. They'd implore God to keep their corn and roots and boughs in good health and bring them to harvest. In the days when maps were scarce, 'beating the bounds' helped remind everyone just where the boundaries were. Do you know yours today?


