

From the Vicarage

I received some advice when I was thinking of getting ordained: don't become vicar at a pretty church, you'll have to take lots of weddings! Well, as it turns out, I am vicar of a pretty church, but thankfully I'm not overrun with weddings (yet!), and I do enjoy preparing and taking them.

As I write this, I took a wedding rehearsal last night and the wedding itself will take place tomorrow. It's always interesting to see the couple just before the 'Big Day' and see how their emotions play out. Some get a bit teary as they practise their vows, while others get the giggles. Everyone is a bit nervous with so many preparations over so many months: dresses, suits, flowers, speeches, menus and invitations. Will the families get on? Will the weather hold up? I always remind each couple that as long as they say their vows and sign their names, they'll be married and become husband and wife. Everything else is a bonus.

But there's more going on than just a man and woman becoming husband and wife on their wedding day. Each marriage is a picture, an illustration, of another marriage, a greater marriage. In the Bible, the apostle Paul writes this in his letter to the young church in Ephesus:

"In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. After all, no one ever hated their own body, but they feed and care for their body, just as Christ does the church – for we are members of his body. 'For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh.' This is a profound mystery – but I am talking about Christ and the church." (Ephesians 5:28–32)

One moment it sounds like Paul is talking about men and women getting married, and the next he says he's actually talking about Christ and the church. Marriage between a husband-andwife points to the relationship between Jesus Christ and the church (all people who trust in Jesus).

Now, I'm very aware as I write this that not everyone is married and, among those who are or have been, plenty of marriages are not good marriages for a variety of reasons. But the very fact that we can describe any marriage as 'bad' means we have the idea of a 'good' marriage. When someone puts their trust in Jesus, they become spiritually married to Jesus. This sounds a bit strange, but this marriage is like no other. It won't be abusive in the slightest, but totally loving: Jesus gave himself up for us—he *died* for us! And 'till death us do part' doesn't apply: it'll continue into eternity.

#### KIDS @ ST LUKE'S



Each Sunday, apart from the first Sunday in the month and school holidays, we all gather as a church family. The 10.30 service begins with a children's song, lots of flag-waving and a prayer. The children and leaders then leave for the Meeting Room.

In the Meeting Room the leader explains the theme of the day and we sing a song accompanied by Rowland on his guitar. This is usually followed

by a re-enactment of the Bible passage and a prayer. During the summer term we had been looking at "Meals with Jesus". Resources are from Faith in Kids.

After this the children are split into three groups, the creche, the 4- to 7-year-olds and the 8- to 11-year-olds. Leaders go over points from the story, show illustrations, play games, and have craft activities related to the story. If the weather is fine, we sometimes spend time outside. Refreshments are served at some point. We then return to church. The children are given a take-home sheet so that their parents know what they have been learning about.

Some of the highlights of our sessions have been the re-enactment of the Last Supper sharing the cup of Ribena and breadsticks, the meal with Levi, building a Lego tree and house for Zaccheus, making an i-pod so that we could listen to Jesus, binoculars so that we could look for Jesus and playing with the parachute outside. We always have a lot of fun.

The leaders benefit from the time spent understanding the Bible stories and thinking how to explain them to the children and the children learn about Jesus. Hopefully, they will come to know God in their lives.

Currently, there are 140 plus paid-up annual subscribers with a few complimentary copies going to care homes, schools, advertisers et al within the parish. The magazine is now also published online – since the lockdowns and restrictions associated with Covid – but it's difficult to gauge how many people log-on to read it via our Church website. Are we communicating and engaging enough with the people of the parish through our magazine? If not, do you have any ideas as to how we can increase readership? Annual subscriptions and monies received from our advertisers go to pay for its printing and production. The magazine is not produced for financial profit. The income it generates merely helps to cover its cost.

The current volunteer work – over many hours each month - done by our magazine team with its research, editing, printing, collation, and distribution is thoroughly professional. However, we feel that the magazine as a vehicle for outreach could be immeasurably improved with your help. Do you have any ideas/comments which could help us draw closer to that goal?

In the October issue my Thought for the Month will probably get back to 'events of the day', the seasons of the year and the wonders of God's natural world – all with a bit of thanks to Jesus thrown in for good measure! A monthly contribution by A. N. Other would be fantastic and welcomed by all, I'm sure!





#### A BIG "THANK YOU" FROM PERU

I am pleased to say that I was able to send £1,424 – mainly from donations to the Lent Project, plus some gifts from members of the congregation - to Isabel Montoya in Lima, Peru, to help in the running costs of the school she runs for the children who live in a shanty town. She is very grateful to all who gave donations and asks me to pass on how much she appreciates your gift.



The shanty town spreads over a large area on the outskirts of Lima. For as far as the eye can see, people are living in shacks made up of anything that can provide shelter. Isabel grew up nearby - her father, Julio, whom I first came across several decades ago, was the local pastor. He's long retired, but still plays an active role in church community life. Isabel's husband is now the pastor there.

Several years ago, Isabel realised that the only way to give the children in the shanty town a way out of the poverty trap was to educate them so that they could find good employment. So, she started a school. The last time I saw any photos of the school, it was part of a row of old houses – looking fairly solid, but not in good condition. A few years ago, the roof fell in. It was then a case of "every hand to the pump" for repairs.

Although the school building isn't up to much, the education is second to none. She plays a very active role herself. I've seen photos of Isabel with the under 11s football team proudly displaying the cup they'd won; on school trips to see the alpaca farm; with the cast of the school nativity play - she employs high quality teachers, even if at the end of the day she has to make up the wages by taking some out of her own purse. She does get some help from the local authorities, but it doesn't cover everything. Knowing the background to the school, I was amazed when she sent me some photos of KS2 (juniors) pupils learning about the rain cycle, and older pupils doing experiments in science lessons, complete with lab coats and safety glasses.

Shortly after the school started several years ago, Isabel realised that many children were coming to school hungry. So, she started giving them a meal, which all adds to her costs, but it has had a really positive effect on the health of the children as well as on their education.

In all my contact with Isabel, what really comes through is her faith. Prayer plays a really important part in her life and in the life of the school. I've seen lots of photos of the children in prayer. I know that her faith carries her through when other lesser mortals might have given up. She is really grateful for our help, and our prayers. She asked me if we had any prayer requests, and I have given her the names of several families in our congregation. They now know that prayers are being offered for them from Lima, Peru, as well as from us in Formby. We really are part of the world-wide Christian family!

#### WHY JOIN A HOME GROUP?

Last September, Home Groups were relaunched at St Luke's following the relaxation of COVID restrictions. There are currently six groups, meeting at different times and on different days to accommodate the differing needs of a congregation with a wide age range. After several years in one group, a change of choir meant I also needed to change Home Group, and it was with some trepidation that I signed up to a new group. However, Home Groups usually have similar characteristics, and it was easy to settle in. So, what is special about Home Groups?

- Meeting in a home! This may sound obvious, but a home setting is more relaxed than a church meeting room. This helps to encourage discussion and prayer.
- A group of six to ten people. There are lots of theories about what makes groups work, but essentially there needs to be enough people to ensure that there can be a discussion but not so many that quieter members of the group are unable to contribute.
- Bible Study. Normally groups follow a series based on a book of the Bible or a theme such as prayer. Videos or study guides may be used, which include discussion questions. The same person may lead all the sessions, or the leadership may be shared by several people.

Over the past twelve months we have studied St Luke's Gospel. This includes passages that many of us will have read or heard sermons on many times, but the joy of Home Groups is finding new perspectives when you discuss a passage with other people.

- Prayer for members of the group and their concerns. Modern technology also allows members to share prayer concerns during the week which can be a huge support at times of crisis or immediate need. During the first COVID lockdown, our Whatsapp Group provided valuable encouragement through some dark days.
- A cuppa and chat at the beginning or end of the session, a chance to build friendship and fellowship that is not always possible on a Sunday morning.

Over the years, and at different churches, I have attended several Home Groups: with young adults, mums, and preschool children (yes, with the children playing as we talked!), mixed groups, ladies only. Looking back, the successful ones all shared the features above. This should not surprise me, as the need for this type of fellowship was recognised by the writer of Hebrews almost two thousand years ago. Immediately after our verse for the year, he writes:

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on towards love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another..." Hebrews 10: 24-25a (NIV)

#### FORMBY CIVIC SOCIETY TODAY

The Society walked into the Formby community for the first time in 1953 and has achieved much ever since. In the 20<sup>th</sup> century – that doesn't seem so long ago, does it? – it was a typically British local group working in several different areas and finding both interesting activities for members but also fighting battles for the local community to protect and preserve the community that people so loved. However, times change, and society develops along new lines. A 'Civic Society' is something that may be difficult to explain to younger people today and, like so many other small groups in the community, membership reduces, and it is harder to find either the means or the demand to keep going. Even at the Millennium, our membership figures were much higher and the place of the Formby Society within our community was simply accepted.

We have since then become one of the nation's 'Civic Societies' and, whilst we are still available with our contacts and supports to help local people tackle their problems in the community, we tend now to find ourselves providing items and activities for our members – and seeking to preserve and record our local heritage. We are not yet a 'history society', though that would be my own strength. We do, though, want to maintain Formby's identity and beauty in the face of modern developments especially if they aim to put individual or corporate financial gain before community. We are always happy to provide talks on agreed topics to local social and community groups, and over the past few years we have provided local history input for all our local Primary Schools. It is always a pleasure to meet other people in the community and to help!

In July and August we delivered for members - and their friends and family - a programme of activities that thought would interesting and engaging. We have taken a group of walkers, a few of whom require sticks to support them, on a visit to see the Devil's famous Hole Ravenmeols. It was led by the national expert on this area, Dr. Phil Smith (an FCS member, of course). We have also strolled around

the heart of Formby Village attempting to identify the sites of key features of Formby in the 1600s. We used a selection of old maps to help us. We also met up at Sefton Church to walk around the area covered by what was Sefton Village and to trace the place of the church in 1000 years of history. We walked around the inside and attempted to find a range of pointers to its fascinating past. Towards the end of the month, we enjoyed a talk from a local expert on 'WWII – The War on Merseyside' which followed on from a talk by FCS member Joan Rimmer and myself on 'Formby and WWII' given recently at Formby Library.

We charge very little for what we offer, which includes a glossy full-colour magazine/newsletter three times a year and a set of monthly talks throughout autumn and winter, with mince pies available in December! The cost is only £15 per family per annum – and, as said before, friends and family are always welcome.

Finally, I must mention our major challenge for this year: the opening of a **Heritage Centre in Chapel Lane** to display and explain the key elements of Formby's past. We are doing so as part of a team with local group 'Imagine Formby' and the Parish Council. There is still a lot of work to be done before our initial opening, hopefully in late September. The Centre will be based on the first floor of Woodward's Wine Bar, and the premises will also serve the community as a venue – which will be known as 'The Loft' – for meetings of small arts groups. We are all very excited about the prospect, but aware of just how much we must do yet.

#### A REPORT FROM THE SHYIRA TRUST

## BISHOP AUGUSTIN (KIVU DIOCESE RWANDA) SENDS HIGHLIGHTS OF A TWO-DAY TRAINING COURSE IN JOB CREATION – GISENYI, JULY 07-08, 2023

Bishop Augustin writes -

'One hundred participants from Gisenyi and Nyamyumba ecclesial districts went through a twoday training in job creation. They comprised jobless young people and women below 40 years of age, all having completed at least three years of secondary education, and at most six years of secondary education. The aim of the training is to equip the women and youth with entrepreneurship skills that enable them to fight poverty and improve their living conditions.

The training emphasised the following:

- Developing the desire for entrepreneurship
- Overcoming fear and trusting self-ability to make it
- Choose what you can do best, based on everyone's gifting
- Engage in a business that comes to address a real need on the market (need of market assessment/study)
- Good project design
- The implementation of the project: How to get capital if there is no self-funding ability
- 5 Cs that determine the eligibility for a loan (Character, Capacity, Capital own, Conditions to meet, and Collateral mortgage)

The testimony of an active entrepreneur helped deepen the determination of trainees to go and start something. The areas of interest included farming (fruit trees, sugarcane, other crops...); small businesses, livestock (pig, chicken...). Below are pictures showing how the training went.'



Entrepreneurship is one of the five major projects that the Shyira Trust is currently supporting in Kivu Diocese.

The Trust has transferred £3000 from its unrestricted funds in aid of last May's Flood Appeal for Kivu along with a more recent £25 individual donation. The Flood Appeal for Kivu is now closed.

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


