

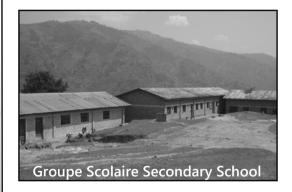

From the Vicarage



Dear Friends

The last two months at St Luke's Formby have been filled with sadness. As you'll see from the Register on the following page, we have had ten funerals and burials in a short space of time. Some have been for long term members of the congregation and others local people who have lived near to St Luke's.

One of the blessings of a church service is the Bible reading, and funerals are no different. Every funeral has at least one Bible reading, and I spend some time talking about what it means and the hope it gives us. As I have reflected on each of the readings that have been chosen, I've been struck afresh by the hope of eternal life that they give us, even from the Old Testament.

For example, two Psalms that are often chosen, Psalm 23 and Psalm 121 both point to eternal life. Psalm 23 begins with the words, "The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing," and ends with, "Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever." Psalm 121 begins, "I lift up my eyes to the mountains—where does my help come from?" and ends, "The Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and for evermore." For ever and for evermore: not just the days of our lives, not just now, but for *ever* and for *evermore*. It would be impossible for these promises of God to be true, unless there is life after death.

What the Old Testament hints at, the New Testament shouts from the roof tops: Jesus is risen! There *is* life after death! Resurrection! Because Jesus came back to life, we can have the hope of resurrection too. The resurrection is central to Christianity. It's why we celebrate Easter and it's why Christians meet on a Sunday.

In fact, it's so central, so essential, the apostle Paul says this in the New Testament:

For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. (1 Corinthians 15:16–19)

If there is no life after death and no hope of resurrection, then Christianity is a waste of time, and we might as well believe in fairy tales. But, if Jesus has been raised from the dead, then it changes everything. Death is no longer the end. This life is not all there is. I wonder do you know this hope? I'd love to tell you more!

Former Head of M15 to lead search for new Archbishop of Canterbury

The Prime Minister has appointed Lord Evans of Weardale KCB DL to chair the new Crown Nominations Commission for Canterbury.

The Crown Nominations Commission is the C of E committee that will nominate the candidate to be the next Archbishop of Canterbury. Archbishop Welby completed his duties on 6th January.

Jonathan Evans has been a crossbench member of the House of Lords since 2014. Until October 2023 he was Chair of the Committee on Standards in Public Life. He is currently Chair of the HALO Trust, the anti-landmine charity, and of the Public Interest Committee at KPMG UK. He is a former Director-General of the Security Service, MI5. He is an active and communicant member of his local parish church.

DIOCESE OF LIVERPOOL HAS GROWN TO PRE-PANDEMIC LEVEL

Recent figures released by the national church show that membership in worshipping communities across the Diocese of Liverpool has surpassed pre-pandemic levels. Attendance has increased from 24,700 in 2019 to 25,500 in 2023, making Liverpool one of the few dioceses to achieve this. It is also the only diocese in the northwest to see such a turnaround, reflecting the dedicated efforts of parishes and deaneries in introducing people to Jesus.


Bishop John expressed his gratitude, stating, "I thank God for all the work being carried out across our diocese. So many gifted, committed, and faithful servants are bringing people to Jesus week after week".

While growth remains fragile, it is a source of encouragement. The Diocese is seeing positive change through efforts such as Church Wigan and Fit for Mission. Wigan is currently showing the greatest growth, with over 1,700 people attending inherited church activities and 1,400 more involved in 48 new worshipping communities. Additionally, 2,700 people engage with new initiatives like the pantry network and CAP debt centre.

Bishop John acknowledged that while the road ahead is challenging, the work already done shows the potential for continued growth. "Through God's grace and in the strength of the Spirit, we can introduce more people to Jesus and deepen discipleship", he said.

As we approach Christmas, Bishop John reflected with gratitude on the growth that has occurred, thanking all who have contributed to this progress.

CHRISTIANS IN SYRIA

This is an edited article submitted by church members Hugh and Anne Dixon. It contains extracts from a recent email prayer letter they received from their friend in Jordan.

"From 2000-2011, I travelled to Damascus in Syria to scope out Bible background sites. I got to know the Christian and Missionary Alliance pastor there at St. Ebbe's.

Life for Christians in Syria under the Assads was in some ways good. One pastor told me that they as Christians could do anything if the authorities knew about it in advance. Everything was very tightly controlled. Then came thirteen years of civil war. The pastor in Tartus said that one of the big problems he faced was the dire economic situation which made serving in the church so hard; many believers had to have two jobs so could not help much. Also, large numbers of believers emigrated during the war to be replaced by believers and non-believers who had been internally displaced. So, the war has also been a real opportunity.

After the difficult time of the civil war, Christians who have stayed in Syria can be seen as perseverers who have not emigrated and have followed the call of Christ. If they have coped with thirteen years of civil war and the dangers of ISIS (particularly in the North where at least one believer was martyred) then in some ways they will be ready for their new Jihadi masters even though this is still a very uncertain time for them. They know all about surviving and ministering under 'controlling' regimes. On December 11th, Christians there had a national day of fasting and prayer. Christians in Syria need our prayers at this time.

The Christian and Missionary Alliance Church (CMA) in Syria has around 2,300 members in 23 churches with only 8 ordained ministers.

Millions of Syrians poured out into countries like Jordan or were made internal refugees by the civil war that followed the attempted Syrian revolution. This massive displacement has been a huge tragedy but also a huge opportunity. Thousands have come under the sound of the gospel because of these people movements and large numbers are now believers. As I write, there is a steady stream of Syrians returning to their homeland across the Jordanian border - which is good news.

Christian groups like the CMA and the Anglicans are so involved in needed refugee ministries that it seems very unlikely that there will be moves against their activities but of course we do not know. What the new Syrian leader is quoted as saying with regard to treatment of Christians can be seen here: <u>https://jihadwatch.org/2024/12/al-jolani-when-we-build-the-islamic-caliphate-christians-will-pay-jizya-under-islamic-sharia</u>"

In 2010 Hugh and Anne went with their friend to the archaeological sites at Amrit and Ugarit. At Amrit was the oldest running track in the world dating back to 1300 BC (around the biblical time of the Judges). There they held a series of sports called the "religious games" – 1000 years before the Greeks used the Olympic idea!





CELEBRATING 20 YEARS IN BOOTLE: 2004-2024

We have recently received two documents prepared by YKids to mark their 20th anniversary. The first is an overview of the many different projects undertaken in the local community, which include work with children and young people, training in youth and children's work, community projects, schools' work, family projects, courses in practical skills to promote wellbeing, social enterprises and faith-based activities. The second is the Faith Impact Report which

focuses on "Making Jesus Known".

The YFaith projects are aimed at helping young people and families to discover the good news of a personal faith in Jesus in exciting and life changing ways. Regular events include:

- Monday Night Live a monthly outreach event for 11–18-year-olds with an inhouse youth band, guest speakers and gospel-based content on a big screen.
- Weekly Faith Groups for 14–21-year-olds. One of these groups has grown from four regular attenders to over thirty in the last two years.
- Occasional all age services held on Saturdays.
- Resourcing for other groups across Merseyside.
- Community work including hosting a quarterly prayer breakfast.
- Work in local schools including delivering faith assemblies and student mentoring.
- Digital outreach through YFaith on Instagram and YouTube.

The continued creativity and vision of the YKids team is amazing, and the testimonies of some of the young people contained in the report bear witness to the positive impact of the charity's work.

Allow us to tell you the story of Elizabeth. She is a trainee at White Angels Single Mothers' Association (WASIMA), a training centre in rural Uganda supporting young women and their children. It is hard to imagine a challenge greater than that which faced her. The father of her child died when she was 6 months pregnant - Elizabeth, literally, had nowhere to go.

Fortunately, she was able to reach out, and at WASIMA, Elizabeth learnt how to make bags, shirts, dresses, and cushions - items of breathtaking beauty out of needle and thread. From the funds she raises through selling them in the market, or to other women she's met at WASIMA, she earns just enough to make a living. Elizabeth now attends the centre as often as she can, using a sewing machine donated by TWAM. "It is hard to make a living", she told us, "but at least single mothers like me can support each other and our children". Her daughter, Betta, is now six years old and attends school.

The very real effect of a single sewing machine can be clearly felt, not just on Elizabeth's life, but on her daughter's, and on the lives of all the women who share experience, ideas, and skills with her. As Elizabeth sews her next skirt or handbag, she's ensuring a better future for her daughter, and taking part in her community. It is your donation that has enabled TWAM to reach these peoples' lives, and your generosity that has empowered Elizabeth. Thank you for being part of this transformation.






