

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends



A few weeks ago, I got an alert on my phone one Thursday afternoon. It told me that the geomagnetic activity was about 600 nanotesla (nT). That probably won't mean much to many of you, so let me briefly explain. When there are sudden changes in the earth's magnetic field, it is usually due to solar activity. Charged particles from a solar flare on the sun are reaching the earth and as these charged particles whizz through the atmosphere, they change the magnetic field, and scientific instruments record that change. Basically, enough charged particles, and my phone buzzes.

So, why do I care?! Well, when lots of charged particles hit the atmosphere, they interact with gases in our atmosphere, which start to glow. The sky glows green or red or even purple. Aurora! Or to give it its full scientific name: "aurora borealis"—the northern lights. That Thursday afternoon, I kept checking my phone as the sun set and it started to get dark. The activity increased and decreased a bit over the next few hours, but it was still high. I started to get excited! Once it was dark enough, I headed down to the Lifeboat Road carpark and joined quite a crowd. Sure enough, there were red patches and green patches in the sky. As my eyes got used to the darkness, I could occasionally see lines of red coming down from higher up. It was amazing, and beautiful. And sadly, my photographs don't do it justice by a long shot!

Since childhood, I've been interested in astronomy. I used to gaze up at the Milky Way on cold winter nights. I remember the first time I saw craters on the Moon through a telescope and the first times I saw the rings of Saturn and clouds on Jupiter through more powerful telescopes. These things take my breath away, and still do.

Psalm 19 begins with the words:

With every blessing,

The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands. Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they reveal knowledge. They have no speech, they use no words; no sound is heard from them. Yet their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world.

The heavens' beauty and majesty point to their creator. A child once exclaimed, "Wow! If they are this beautiful underneath, how much more beautiful must they be on top?!" Indeed, how much more beautiful must God be who dreamt up not only the physical laws of charged particles, but also the breathtaking beauty that they paint in our skies. As a scientist, as well as a Christian, I can say he is definitely someone worth getting to know.





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

BIBLE GALLERY ON LAKE CONSTANCE (BIBELGALERIE)

Several years ago, on our trip across Europe we stayed on Lake Constance in a town called Meersburg. When we came home, we mentioned this to Joyce Eddlestone because we knew that she had visited the same area. Joyce told us about the Bibelgalerie and so on our next holiday we decided to give it a go. Unfortunately, it was all in German and our lack of language skills meant we missed much of the meaning.

This year having heard that the Galerie had been updated, we decided to go again. There is now commentary and text in English, so we found it much more interesting! It's also possible

The Bibelgalerie is housed in a former Dominican Convent called 'Heiligkreuz' (Holy Cross). There are frescoes of St Catherine of Siena and St Christopher carrying the infant Jesus across a swollen river. These were uncovered and restored when the building was renovated in the 1980's but all the communal spaces are thought to have been decorated with beautiful frescoes. You can see the original well that supplied water to the convent and a

mock-up of the kind of tent Moses and the Israelites would have used on their journey through the desert. The tent is made out of authentic materials such as goat's hair used in the Old Testament times of Abraham and Sarah, and it is about a third of normal size. The articles around it, such as the grinding stones, illustrate daily life at that time.

The link between the deanery of Sefton and the deanery of Überlingen-Stockach began nearly 30 years ago when it was arranged for a group of German clergy to come and stay with the clergy in Sefton for a long weekend. However, the clergy of Sefton were unable to provide enough accommodation, so Joyce and her husband Mike agreed to accommodate a German vicar.

Joyce says, "Having spent our holidays in Germany and Austria and as we speak some German, we offered to have a German guest. Our guest, a larger-than-life bouncy German vicar arrived, Peter. His parish was on the banks of Lake Constance, in a place called Immenstaad. During that weekend we got to know the rest of the group as well and we have lasting friendships with many of them. One of the group was Thea Groß, who has become a very good friend and has visited Formby many times as part of the group and has come with her family as well.

Thea has devoted nearly all of her working life to the creation and running of the Bible Gallery in Meersburg which is a beautiful town on the banks of Lake Constance and attracts huge numbers of tourists each year. The churches thought that it would be a good idea to provide some outreach of the gospel with so many people around. They chose the name "Bibelgalerie" because they felt that the word "museum" wouldn't be as attractive."

Lake Constance (Bodensee in German) is 63km long on the borders of Germany, Switzerland and Austria. It's fed by the Rhine River and ferries cross the lake all day. If you are feeling energetic, the Bodensee-radweg cycle path encircles the entire lake. We never stay long enough to do that!

St Luke's PCC continue to donate 10% of the monies received through voluntary giving each year to eleven different charities. This is one of an occasional series of articles highlighting the work of one of those charities.

THE BIBLE SOCIETY

I am writing this article in early October, as we approach St Luke's Day, which is celebrated on October 18. Luke's legacy is two substantial books in the New Testament, his Gospel and then the Acts of the Apostles which tells us how Christianity spread outwards from Jerusalem. The current sermon series has followed the early chapters of Acts, and we have seen how the apostles used their knowledge of the Old Testament history and prophecies in their preaching and evangelism. We have also learned that it was persecution that drove the early disciples away from Jerusalem to settle in other Roman provinces and to spread the Good News of the Gospel further afield.

Some 1800 years later, in rural mid Wales, a young girl called Mary Jones, the daughter of a poor widow, was so determined to have a Bible of her own that she worked and saved through her teenage years. When she finally had enough money, she walked twenty-six miles to Bala to purchase a Welsh language Bible of her own. The bookseller, Thomas Charles, was so moved by her determination that he gave her two additional Bibles to take back to her village. Inspired by Mary, Welsh pastors started to campaign for more affordable Bibles and this campaign was subsequently taken up by the MP, William Wilberforce, which led to the foundation of the British and Foreign Bible Society in 1804. Now known simply as the Bible Society, the charity continues the task of making the Bible available to all people in their own language.

Today, Christians in many parts of the world are faced with the challenges of conflict and persecution. The Bible Society continues to take the Good News to such places, and it is remarkable to discover how the Christian church continues not only to survive but grow in the face of adversity, just as it did in Luke's lifetime. Two recent examples are:

- In war torn areas of Ukraine, Ukrainian Bible Society staff are not only delivering Bibles, but studying the Scriptures and praying with groups of soldiers. They also deliver food and medical supplies, risking their own lives when they go into areas where there is fighting. Over £1 million has been donated from the UK for the purchase of Bibles and the Bible based handbook "Beyond Disaster" to help those suffering from trauma.
- The church in China has been subject to severe persecution over the years and at one time the Bible was banned. However, the Bible Society has been able to work with the Chinese authorities so that Bibles are now printed in China. The Christian church has experienced rapid growth but there is still a need for study resources for fellowship groups and trained leaders, which the Bible Society is working to provide.

Let us continue to pray for the work of the Bible Society as it seeks to make the Scriptures accessible to all people, regardless of their situation.





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
